Kidney Transplant

Selection Criteria – Who Can Get a Kidney Transplant?



What makes someone a good candidate for a transplant?

Patients who have or are nearing end stage renal disease (ESRD) may be looked at for a kidney transplant. Atrium Health Carolinas Medical Center does not have an age standard. All patients are reviewed on a case-by-case basis. This helps to look at all people in a fair and nondiscriminatory way.

What things could cause problems with a transplant?

A. You can't have a transplant if you:

- 1. Have a substance abuse problem
- 2. Have advanced heart disease
- 3. Refuse or do not want a transplant
- 4. Have dementia that is getting worse or severe, or mental problems that keep you from following the medical treatment plan
- 5. Have cancer that is untreated or active

B. You may not be able to have a transplant if you:

- 1. Have collagen vascular disease (disease that affects your connective tissue such as lupus or rheumatoid arthritis)
- 2. Have untreated or uncontrolled HIV infection
- 3. Use tobacco and have diabetes (high blood sugar) or heart or lung disease
- 4. Have advanced cerebrovascular (disease that affects blood vessels and blood supply to the brain) or neurodegenerative (disease that affects nerve cells in the brain) disease

- 5. Have advanced heart failure (unless you are a candidate for combined heart and kidney transplant)
- 6. Have advanced liver disease (unless you are a candidate for combined liver and kidney transplant)
- 7. Have an infection that is long-lasting or active
- 8. Have marked deconditioning (many changes in body systems brought about by physical inactivity and disuse) or poor functional status (ability to do normal daily activities)
- 9. Are morbidly obese which means you have a body mass Index (BMI) over 40. You may be a candidate if you are under age 40 and you don't have other chronic diseases.
- 10. Show a pattern of not being able to follow the treatment plan
- 11. Refuse to take blood products and your hemoglobin is less than 12
- 12. Have severe, chronic lung disease
- 13. Have severe malnutrition (lack of proper nutrition)
- 14. Have severe peripheral vascular disease (blood circulation disorder)
- 15. Do not have the support of family, friends or a social network to help you with your treatment plan and follow-up
- 16. Have untreated urologic disease (disease of urinary tract)
