Haney retires

Dona Haney, nurse educator at Mercy School of Nursing, retired in August after 43 years in the healthcare field. Dona received her BSN in 1969 and her MSN in 1984 from the University of North Carolina - Charlotte. Dona was inducted into Sigma Theta Tau (the nursing honor society) at UNCC in 1981 and received the Leadership Award in 1991.


Dona's first years as a registered nurse were spent at Charlotte Memorial Hospital (now CMC-Main) as a staff nurse, then head nurse on a surgical unit. During this time, she also was a clinical instructor for UNCC. In 1977, Dona joined Mercy Hospital (now CMC-Mercy) as the first Infection Control nurse clinician. In this capacity, Dona witnessed many changes in practices associated with Infection Control during her 25 years in this field. She also had the

The official kickoff for the revival of the Mercy School of Nursing Alumni Association was celebrated with a get together for Charlotte area alumni at CMC – Mercy Hospital on January 31, 2012.

This special evening started with a social hour at the Spirit of Mercy History Room, located at CMC-Mercy Hospital. This unique room was created by

Lynda Opdyke, former MSON Associate Dean, to showcase memorabilia from the original MSON building, and Mercy Hospital.

After the social hour and hospital tours, the alumni reconvened in the hospital auditorium for a program that included updates on CMC-Mercy Hospital, Mercy School of Nursing and plans for the new MSON Alumni Association.

From the Dean

On August 3, 2012, Mercy School of Nursing graduated 35 new nurses. This is a very special time in the lives of our students. From the beginning of their time at Mercy School of Nursing, our students have been working hard to reach this goal in their educational journey. As faculty and administration we celebrate with them but continue to encourage them on

a path of lifelong learning once they graduate. At Mercy School of Nursing, we talk to our students about obtaining their BSN and eventually graduate nursing education.

North Carolina along with the rest of the country is facing a nursing workforce shortage that will impact the quality of healthcare. The NC Center for Nursing forecasts that without significant changes there will a potential shortage of 32,000 registered nurses in the state of North Carolina by 2020 (NC Center for Nursing, 2006). There is a demand for an increase in the educational preparation of nurses due to the technological advances in healthcare and increased patient acuity faced by nurses today as well as nurses of the future. The 2004 NC Institute of Medicine (IOM) Nursing Workforce Report and the 2010 IOM Report on the Future of Nursing have recommended that the proportion of baccalaureate-prepared nurses (BSN) be increased to 60% and 80% respectively by 2020. In the United States, a majority of new nursing graduates received their nursing education from an associate degree program.

Mercy School of Nursing (MSON) has formed an educational partnership with Cabarrus College of Health Sciences to answer the IOM Report's recommendation for increasing the number of baccalaureate-prepared nurses. Beginning in the fall semester 2012, students can be dually enrolled as a Mercy School of Nursing student and a non-degree Cabarrus College of Health Sciences student. MSON students will be able to take general education courses toward the completion of their BSN at Cabarrus College while taking pre-licensure nursing courses at Mercy. Students will sign a letter of intent during their second semester at MSON indicating their desire to continue on at Cabarrus College upon graduation. Graduates who have maintained a 2.5 GPA at MSON and pass the NCLEX-RN to obtain licensure will automatically transition to Cabarrus College's RN-BSN program to complete the post-licensure nursing courses required to complete a BSN. The total enrollment time to complete both programs is 32-36 months. Mercy School of Nursing and Cabarrus College of Health Sciences are excited to provide this new educational pathway for Mercy students. As recognition for her body of work in this field, she was chosen as one of the North Carolina Great 100 Nurses in 1990 and was named the North Carolina Practitioner of the Year by the Association of Professionals in Infection Control (APIC) in 1991.

Dona joined the Mercy School of Nursing faculty in 2003. For nine years, she was a role model and mentor for more than 750 students as she nurtured them toward becoming skilled and professional registered nurses. In recognition of her dedication to CMC-Mercy, Mercy School of Nursing and her students, she was recognized for commitment by CMC-Mercy on the Values in Action Wall in 2012.

As a nurse, Dona was an active participant in the many transformations in healthcare and nursing education. Through it all, she always conducted herself with dignity, grace, and professionalism. Her warmth and caring attitude was evident in any role she assumed. These qualities made her a valuable asset in her role as a nurse educator, mentoring the next generation of nurses. Her commitment to CMC-Mercy, her colleagues, her community and those she served, and continues to serve, is more than a word. It is her lifestyle. She will be missed.

School news

It seems hard to believe that it has been six years since the school's move to the Forest Point location. The time has gone by quickly, especially with all the activities that have

taken place. Striving for excellence is an everyday occurrence, but I want to highlight a few shining moments.

Through the dedication of the faculty and staff, MSON was able to offer an evening/ weekend program for working adults,

beginning in the fall of 2009. MSON continued to offer the standard day program as well. This small inaugural class graduated in December of 2012. Two more evening classes were added in fall 2010 and fall 2011. Beginning in the spring of 2013, MSON will admit a full evening/ weekend cohort that will complete the program by August of 2014. The school offers the only entry-level evening program in Mecklenburg and surrounding counties.

In August of 2011, the school was selected by the North Carolina Nurses Association to receive Hallmarks of Healthy Workplaces recognition. MSON was the first (and so far only) nursing education program in the state to receive this honor. Additionally, the school received full accreditation by the National League for Nursing Accrediting Committee in March of 2012

Most recently, the school has begun working with Cabarrus College of Health Sciences to offer MSON students an opportunity to complete classes that will lead to a bachelor's degree in nursing while enrolled at MSON. Current students are eligible to take up to 18 credit hours. Once the student graduates and passes the NCLEX, it is possible that the graduate could receive the bachelor's degree in three additional semesters at Cabarrus. This is exciting news for our students and has generated a great deal of interest.
