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




A school nurse called when a high school student took two doses of medicine within a short period of time because it hadn't kicked in right away. The school nurse knew she could count on the Poison Center.

How did the person come in contact with the poison?

Over-the-counter and prescription medications are one of the main reasons people call us. Avoid a medication poisoning by:

- Always following directions on the package
- Never taking more than the prescribed dose
- Never taking medicine not meant for you






The Poison Center is not just for parents. Calls from or about senior adults are among the fastest growing type, increasing 30% within the last five years.





You shouldn't wait for symptoms to appear before calling the Poison Center. Symptoms may be delayed.



Growth in the Hispanic population rose steadily in North Carolina in the 1990s. North Carolina had the fastest growing population of Hispanics in the country, according to one economic development center, with more than 300,000 new residents. By 2008, about 7.5 percent of North Carolina's total population was estimated to be Hispanic.

Carolinas Poison Center has 24/7 access to interpreters for non-English speaking callers. We continue to reach the changing face of North Carolina through participation in Hispanic health events and Spanish education materials.

In 2009, the center produced two companion pieces for Hispanic parents and caregivers related to medication dosing safety.

Both educational items emphasize the immediate help that the Poison Center provides when someone has questions or concerns about giving medicine to children.

• Dosis Apropiadas De Acetaminofén Para Niños is a medicine dosing tool for parents who give acetaminophen (a pain reliever) to their children.

• Como darle Acetaminofeno a su Hijo is a DVD that highlights a common parenting scenario that could lead to uncertainty or confusion when dosing acetaminophen.






Learning How We Help

One of the Poison Center's primary goals is to prevent poisonings, which are a significant and largely preventable public health problem. We do this by reaching out to the public with education and information. We also work with other health organizations that touch the public as well. Safe Kids, School Nurses' Association of North Carolina, Fire & Life Safety Educators, UNC Institute on Aging and North Carolina Division of Public Health are just a few of our partners.

In 2008 and 2009, Carolinas Poison Center distributed more than 150,000 educational items like poison safety brochures, refrigerator magnets, dosing spoons and phone stickers-- all with YOU in mind. We reached individuals, schools, daycare facilities, hospitals, businesses and community organizations with our poison prevention message.

Your phone number is the most helpful in the police department phone book.




A police officer called when he was searching for drug identification information about a pill he found. Linda at the Poison Center assisted him. He told her that he found the Poison Center to be invaluable.

Protecting Your Health

We are constantly alert to widespread dangers that could put your health at risk. Since we are the call center for the state concerning exposures to and information about poisonings, we know if something big is about to happen. We send real-time data to the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services and to the National Poison Data System. This means we're always looking for health alerts or outbreaks like H1N1 flu. In 2009, Carolinas Poison Center operated the emergency help line for North Carolinians with questions about H1N1 flu medicine or vaccine.
