<u>Introduction</u>

The Mission of Cabarrus College is to provide progressive, exemplary healthcare education. Healthcare professionals encounter various Social Drivers of Health throughout their service to the community. Intentional volunteer efforts expose students to a plethora of healthcare disparities, which provide students with the opportunity to reflect and envision how their role as a healthcare professional can address inequities facing the communities that they will one day serve.

This handbook provides you with guidelines for volunteer community service at Cabarrus College. Included is the College-approved listing of local nonprofit, government, and community-based organizations where students may complete their volunteer hours. Students are also encouraged to research and select their own volunteer locations. These activities will help students develop their understanding of social drivers of health and the associated health outcomes.

Guidelines

1. Hours

- a. Most students must accrue 15 volunteer hours before graduation.
- b. This table delineates the requirement:

Level	CHSI	Diploma	Associates	Bachelor's	Master's
Hours	15	15	15	15	15

- c. Hours are due on the Monday of Week 12 leading into graduation.
- d. Students should pace themselves to avoid needing to accrue a large number of hours in a short period of time. Some strategies may include:
 - i. Earning 5 hours per semester.
 - ii. Earning half of the required hours within the first year.
- e. Students who do not earn 15 hours before graduation will have their degrees held until the requirement is satisfied.

2. Volunteer Locations

- a. Preapproved volunteer locations can be found here.
- b. Students are also encouraged to find their own volunteer locations which align with their interests, values, and geographical location.
 - i. A table contrasting acceptable and unacceptable locations is found in Appendix A.
- The Volunteer Requirement is separate from an individual course's Service-Learning Requirement.
 - a. A table contrasting charity, volunteering, and service-learning can be found in Appendix B.
 - b. Service-Learning hours will count towards the Volunteer Requirement.
 - c. Volunteer hours **may not always count** towards Service-Learning hours. This is at the discretion of a course's instructor.

4. Incentive

The goal of volunteering is to expand students' understanding of social drivers of health and to develop as socially cognizant healthcare professionals. To encourage engagement, students should strive to meet one of the three incentive tiers based on the number of hours accrued by the end of their time at Cabarrus College:

Tier	Hours	Incentive
Tier I	15 Hours	Base Requirement
Tier II	30 Hours	Certificate
Tier III	60 Hours	Graduation Cord

Instructions for Students

- 1. Select a volunteer agency.
 - a. Do not wait until the last minute, as it may take time before you can schedule a volunteer opportunity.
- 2. Contact the agency.
 - a. Ensure that they are willing to accept volunteers.
 - b. Ensure that you will have an assigned supervisor.
 - c. Plan a date and time for your first volunteer experience.
 - d. Ask about the dress code.
 - e. Verify the address and parking so you are not late.
 - f. Ask if an orientation session or training is required (this will count towards your hours).

3. Onsite

- a. Remember, you represent Cabarrus College.
- b. Dress in accordance with the guidelines of the agency.
- c. Arrive on time and stay until the end of your scheduled commitment.
- d. Schedule any subsequent volunteer opportunities before you leave.
- 4. Enter your hours in Sonis via the "Pro Bono" tab.
 - a. View Appendix C for a how-to guide.
 - b. Ensure that you answer the following question in the Memo section for each volunteer commitment that you enter:
 - i. Reflecting on your volunteer experience, how did your work engage with a specific social driver of health, and in what ways did it challenge or reinforce existing narratives about health disparities?
- 5. Track your hours individually for your own records, as well. You may also contact the Office of Retention & Student Success if you would like an update.
- 6. Academic Integrity
 - a. The Volunteer Requirement is an official Cabarrus College expectation.
 - b. Any student suspected of falsifying their volunteer experiences will be referred to the conduct process overseen by the Dean, Student Affairs and Enrollment Management.




Step 4: You'll need to complete the form for each volunteer opportunity that you've completed.

- In the "Memo" section, answer the following question:


