Trach Tube Cleaning: Bivona Trachs

Once your child is discharged from the hospital, you will be given **4 tracheostomy tubes initially: 2 for regular trach changes, 1 emergency back-up of the same size, and 1 emergency back-up that is one size smaller.** After this, you will routinely receive 2 Bivona trachs every 10 weeks that are your child's primary trach size. This is different than when your child was in the hospital.

Do NOT discard a Bivona trach unless there are signs of damage or you have sanitized the trach 5 times.

If you are admitted to the hospital, trach tubes already in the sanitizing/cleaning cycle will not be cleaned. Save those trachs for home use. We will sterilize Bivona trachs that are inserted for the first time during a hospitalization.

Cleaning:

- Look for any signs of damage.
- Soak the trach tube and the obturator, separately, in a container of warm water and mild soap for 1 hour. Be sure that the parts are completely submerged in the water.
- Flush the soapy water through the tube. Remove any debris on the outside and inside of trach with a lint-free swab or brush. Can pull a small portion of the swab through the tube to thoroughly clean.
- Look for any remaining secretions and debris and repeat the soaking/cleaning process if needed.

Sanitation:

- After cleaning, sanitize the trach.
- Option 1:
 - Place trach pieces in a pot of rapidly boiling water.
 - Cover and remove pot from heat source.
 - Remove trach pieces from pot when the water is comfortable to touch. Handle the obturator by its handle and the trach tube by the flanges.
 - o Once dry, store for later use.
- Option 2:
 - o Place the cleaned trach and obturator in a baby bottle sterilizer and follow product instructions to sanitize.

Storage:

• Store the trach in a clean, sealed container to avoid contamination after you sanitize the trach(s) and to avoid secretions drying out and hardening before sanitation.
