

And cover the trash can with a tight lid! You told me that, Sandra!







Another thing: Don't leave bowls of pet food out overnight.




out, hunh? OK, what's another way?

OK... These traps have killed all the ants....


AIEEEEE!

Most pesticides have an EPA* registration number on the label. You shouldn't use anything that doesn't have an EPA number.

Never buy unlabeled pesticides at places like flea markets.







