Healthcare workers have a 20% higher chance of being the victim of workplace violence than others in the workforce, according to the National Crime Victimization Survey

According to the American Nurses Association, 1 out of 4 nurses are assaulted on the job

47% of physicians say they have been physically assaulted at work, according to the American College of Emergency Physicians (ACEP)

From 2002 to 2013, OSHA reports the rate of serious workplace violence incidents (resulting in days off work for injury) was more than four times greater in healthcare than in private industry. Healthcare accounted for nearly as many serious violent injuries as all other industries combined

An Annals of Emergency Medicine study identified 154 shootings with injuries at U.S. hospitals, resulting in death or injury to 235 people between 2000 and 2011. Five of the 40 states that had shootings – including NC – accounted for more than a third of the events
